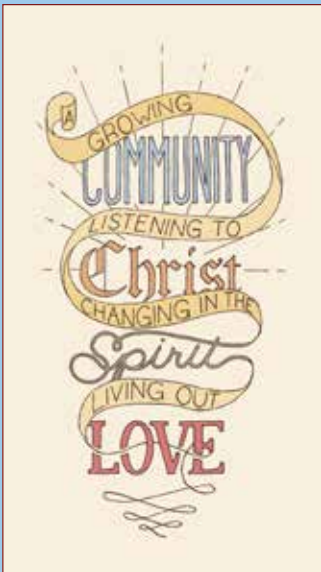

Living Out Love Locally ▶ Globally

I have been teaching at Newberg High School for 19 years. I primarily teach health classes to 14-16-year-olds. I am amazed at the ways



God has taught me in my 19 years of teaching high school. I generally have around 35 students in my classes. One of the biggest challenges is grappling with the diversity of life experience and perspective in the room. Some students have been exposed to substance abuse from an early age, some have been sexually active for years before they start high school. I have always seen my teaching as a ministry. When I began teaching, I thought my mission was to convert students into people who saw the world like me. I quickly found that this is not a sustainable way to live out love in the world. I learned over the first few years of my career that loving people in our community meant accepting them as they are, where they are—learning about their lives and their perspectives. My vision for ministry in the community quickly changed. I love being able to laugh with students, to learn and discuss challenging social topics and to give students the room they need to evaluate their lives on their terms. I assess learning in the classroom, and students receive a grade in my class, but the heart of what I do is much deeper than that. It is a struggle to balance caring about a student's life and avoiding the impulse to control it along with their choices. I continue to walk that struggle daily.

One of my passions is seeing students become indignant about injustice in the world and to begin working to make our community a better place, locally or globally. When students realize that racism and sexism and other forms of discrimination are some of the biggest barriers to health, they begin to explore ways they can work to improve the lives of their families and people in their communities. I love to see the spark of love ignite in the lives of young minds. I love to see God working in the world. I struggle to let God be in control of the outcomes. I struggle to live out love in ways that are supportive and sustainable. God continues to transform me in this process, and it is good.

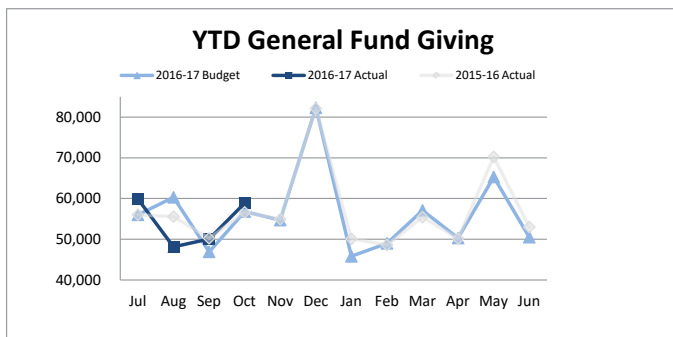

You may have seen an article in last Wednesday's *Newberg Graphic* about the settlement of a lawsuit regarding sex abuse by Bruce Bishop, former youth superintendent of our yearly meeting. We would like to clarify that to the best of our knowledge, there were no allegations that sexual abuse occurred at our church; rather, the conduct was alleged to have taken place at other locations.

We place a high value on safety for our children and youth, and have had policies to prevent abuse in place since 1994. We've updated them continuously, including this past summer. We are setting practices that show zero tolerance for abuse, because we want to be safe and transparent. We always welcome your comments about how we can improve our procedures and are committed to the safety of children and youth taking priority over any other concerns.

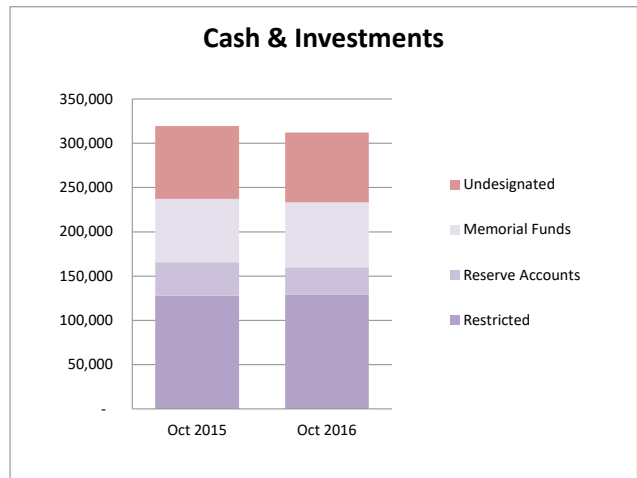

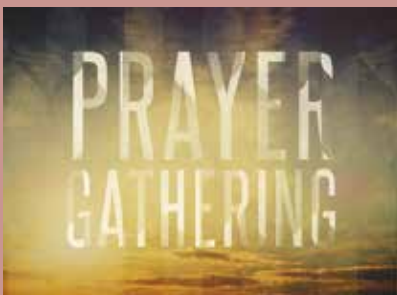

The first new cabin in 50 years!

Every year we work together to take an offering at our local churches and meetings for a special project. This is our way to allow our thankfulness to overflow to those in need. Please consider giving generously to Quaker Cove Camp in Anacortes, Washington. With your help, we will build a new cabin at the camp, which will provide eight additional beds for guests to sleep in.



Quaker Cove in Anacortes, Washington

■ Quaker Cove was bought in 1930 and has been managed by the Puget Sound Area Friends Churches. The camp was a thriving ministry, but in the last 20 years, involvement and camp use has dwindled. The camp lost volunteers and because of that the camp started to lose money each year and buildings became unusable.

In 2013 Karl & Liz (Sugden) Seume felt God calling them to Quaker Cove from their home in Germany. With their three kids in tow the Seumes moved



from Germany to Quaker Cove in 2015. Liz writes the following: “When we arrived at Quaker Cove finances were rough and there was a lot of work that needed to be done in order to get the camp in a condition where it could be rented out to groups.”

Over the past year God has met every need that has come

to Quaker Cove. Group rentals, people, and supplies to help improve the camp were among the top needs. The first Sunday the Seumes visited a church in town, the pastor informed them their church had felt called to put on a middle school camp, and they would be deciding on a location that week. The church partnered with Quaker Cove to do the camp, and over half of the students that came committed their lives to following Jesus for the first time. God is working and God is moving! The camp income went from \$4,500 the previous year to over \$37,000 this year so far. Giving has also gone from \$6,000 to \$30,000. This has made it possible for the Seumes to tackle some of the most necessary projects, but they still have a long way to go. In order for the camp to survive and grow, it has to be able to host more people year round. In the summer, the camps rustic cabins can host 75-85 people in a group. In the winter, however, there are only four cabins (30 beds) that are useable.



So we offer these needs to you, Friends, as the 2016 Thanksgiving Offering. With your help Quaker Cove will use what is raised to replace the Everett cabin, which has been out of use for many years and cannot be repaired. This will provide Quaker Cove with eight more warm beds

year round and include a toilet and shower. The cabin costs around \$20,000. Quaker Cove is confident that with the extra capacity the cabin would provide, the cabin would pay for itself within two years. This would be the first new building at Quaker Cove in 50 years!
